

**FACULTY POSITION:
MEDICAL DIRECTOR OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE CLINICAL RESEARCH
AND TREATMENT**

The Dept. of Psychiatry and Behavioral Neurosciences (DPBN) at Wayne State University (WSU) invites applications for a faculty position as the Medical Director of the Substance Abuse Research Division (SARD), preferably at the Assistant Professor level (Clinician/Educator Track), to begin as soon as possible. The responsibilities of this position include overseeing all medical aspects of substance abuse research and clinical treatment operations of the division, which includes a well-equipped and staffed human psychopharmacology laboratory, outpatient treatment program, and medical screening/support facilities.

Applicants should have a U.S. medical degree or equivalent, board certification, preferably with post-doctoral credentialing in addiction psychiatry or addiction medicine, licensure (or license-eligible) to practice in the State of Michigan and DEA licensure (preferably waived to prescribe buprenorphine). We seek individuals with clinical and teaching experience in substance abuse, with the potential to develop multidisciplinary team approaches. Applicants with programmatic interests in neuroscience, pharmacotherapies, behavioral treatments, pain, polydrug abuse and prescription misuse, psychiatric comorbidity, or special populations (e.g. HIV/AIDS, pregnant females) will provide synergy with existing faculty activities.

Successful candidates will have demonstrated leadership and high ethical responsibility, being able to work collaboratively, and a history of successful administrative/supervisory experience. A record of scholarly output and/or scholarly intention is required as a WSU faculty member. Expertise in treating co-occurring disorders (dual diagnosis) is highly valued. Salary and benefits are highly competitive.

The Medical Director exercises a broad range of leadership and performance responsibilities. These include: research screening and patient intake physical examinations (or designate to resident/fellow as appropriate); review laboratory tests (e.g. blood chemistry, ECG) and routinely review patient charts; prescribe medication, oversee medication procurement (e.g. methadone), maintain record-keeping, and minimize

diversion per DEA requirements; provide medical approval, monitoring of, and assistance with psychopharmacology research protocols to ensure progress and safety, and complete adverse event reports as needed; train and oversee residents and fellows in addiction psychiatry/medicine; provide clear directions to staff; develop new capabilities for clinical revenue and contain costs of existing services; oversee the clinic planning and policy committee; and collaborate in multidisciplinary patient care related to treatment of substance abuse and pain problems at the WSU HIV clinic.

The WSU DPBN/SARD has close ties and/or collaborations with the Departments of Psychology at WSU and University of Windsor (Canada), within the WSU School of Medicine (Anesthesiology, Ob/Gyn, Neurology, Pediatrics, Pharmacology, Radiology) and other WSU Colleges and Centers; as well as Henry Ford Health Systems and the University of Michigan.

WSU School of Medicine, a Carnegie-I research university, has the largest medical school in the U.S. on one campus, including 7 adjacent affiliated health care facilities (Children's Hospital, Detroit Receiving Hospital, Harper Hospital, Karmanos Cancer Institute, Rehabilitation Institute of Michigan, University Health Center, and Veterans Administration Hospital). The WSU SOM annual budget of \$530 million supports training for over 1,000 medical students, 375 graduate students in the basic sciences, and research – ranked 22nd nationally by the NSF – focusing on the neurosciences, maternal and child health, cancer, population studies and urban health.
